
Dear Parents/Carers,

At the end of last week, our Year 6s went to the Big Bang Event at the NEC. This was a great opportunity for the children to be inspired by seeing the STEM subjects (science, technology, engineering and maths) in action and also to find out how these subjects are applied in the real world, such as by seeing the robotic dog which is used to work in disaster zones or dangerous places. Our Year 6s had a fabulous day and they spoke very enthusiastically about this event when I spoke to them.



It has been test week for our Year 1, Year 3, Year 4 and Year 5 pupils this week. They have completed tests for reading, grammar and punctuation and maths. Well done to everybody for completing these.

Eid Mubarak to many of our Muslim families who this week celebrated the festival of Eid al-Adha. This is the second and the largest of the two main holidays celebrated within Islam and it honours the willingness of Prophet Abraham to make a great sacrifice to God. This festival is celebrated by dressing in their best clothes, attending communal prayer, through visiting loved ones and through lots of feasting. I hope that you all had a wonderful day.



This week our Year 5 pupils have been engaging in Bikeability lessons. This is a government run national cycle training programme, which we run annually at Colmers Farm (and forms part of our Colmers Farm, Primary Guarantee), which helps our pupils to learn practical skills, such as how to look after their bikes, and to understand how to cycle on roads. From the Year 5s I spoke to, they enjoyed being involved in this and learnt a lot.

We have two active school councils at our school, one in EYFS/KS1 and one in KS2. Our KS2 school council this week decided that they wanted to raise some money for some additional school playground equipment for playtimes and dinnertimes. You will have already received a letter from them telling you about a planned non-uniform day on Friday 14th July. Hopefully we can all support them to reach the target they have set for this.

Thank you to everybody for your bottle donations on Thursday for the school fair. We really appreciate these. Our school fair will take place next week on Thursday 6th July. We look forward to seeing lots of you there. Please note that we will also be having the Book Fair next week, as encouraging children to read is always a priority at our school. This will be open from Monday to Thursday for parents to purchase any books they wish in the lower hall, including on the school fair date.

This week we were again joined by our 2023/2024 EYFS children as they came for their second visit to our school. This was a lovely opportunity for them to continue to familiarise themselves with our school and to get to know their new teachers and for their new teachers to get to know them.

On Thursday, our EYFS children visited Little Owl Farm Park. They had a fabulous time holding animals, going on a tractor ride (where they were pulled around in a trailer) and watching the sheep racing. They represented our school excellently throughout the trip and they learnt so much from it. My apologies to all of our EYFS parents for the delay with the children returning to school, due to the bus breaking down. This obviously was not a planned experience, but fortunately it did not ruin the day. Thank you for your patience.

Help your child become a better READER.

Questions to ask your child while reading fiction text.

-Who is the main character?


- -What is the setting in the story? Does the setting change?
- -What was the problem in the story and how was it solved?
- -Did the character change during the story? How?
 -How are you like the main character? How are you
 different?
- -What do you predict will happen next in the story?
- -Why do you think the author chose this title for the story?
- -Do you like the title of the story? Why or why not?
 -Can you think of a different title for the story?
- -Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why?
- -Which part of the story was the most exciting? Why?
- -Did you like the end of the story? Why or why not?
- -Which parts in the story could really happen? Which parts could not really happen?

READ, READ!

Reading is a key skill which is so important to any child's development at any age. Please try to listen to your child read at least once a day (for 10-15 mins ideally). It's also great for children to listen to you reading aloud as well.

As you know, our children in Years 1-6 have access to thousands of books online via myON. If you need help accessing this, please contact your child's class teacher or the school office.



Help your child become a better READER

Questions to ask your child while reading nonfiction text.

-What is the main idea of the text?

-Can you tell me something you already know about this topic?

-What did you learn from reading the text?

- -Are there any words that you do not know what they mean?
- -What are some new words that you learned?
- -Do you have any questions after reading this?
- -Were there any features (diagrams, charts, pictures)
 that were important?
 - -Where could you find out more information about this topic?
- -What questions would you ask the author about this topic?
 - -What would be a good title for this text?
- -Can you think of another book that you have read about this topic? How was it similar? How was it different?
 - -Did you like the text? Why or why not?
