<b>Reception:</b>	What activities did you do on number day?

## You have the right to give your opinion, and for adults to listen and take it seriously.

# The Right to Participation is one of the most important principles in becoming a Rights Respecting School.

Participation of children and young people is one of the General Principles of the Convention on the Rights of the Child as it plays a fundamental role in realising all the rights in the Convention for all children.

One of the relevant articles of the Convention that addresses the principle of participation is Article 12, the right to be heard. Article 12 says that every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously. This principle recognises children and young people as actors in their own lives and applies at all times throughout a child's life.

There is also a wider group of rights (or articles) that address the right of children to participate, and which influence our understanding of participation, including a child's right to seek and receive information, to express their own views and to associate with others.

The Rights Respecting Schools Award provides a framework for pupil participation based on the Convention. Adults are encouraged to work with children and young people in an inclusive way to ensure that their views are heard and valued in decision-making. In Rights Respecting Schools, children understand that participation is a right, "an entitlement not a permission."


The experience of participation should be relevant, informed, voluntary, safe, respectful and transparent. Children must not be pressured into participatory activities and independent advocacy support should be sought where appropriate. There is no minimum age at which children can participate and younger children should be offered appropriate support, in line with their evolving capacities, to play an increasingly informed and active role in the school's life.

#### Holidays and Absence during term time

Holiday absence will not be authorised during term time except in exceptional circumstances. It is very important that all parents and carers understand that children with unauthorised absences, including holidays, and unexplained absences will be referred for a Fixed Penalty Notice from Birmingham City Council.

Term time holidays continue to cause significant concern and debate. While there are many different views, the direct correlation between attendance and attainment is underiable.

Absence from school interrupts teaching and learning and compromises progress. Birmingham City Council therefore seeks to support Birmingham schools and academies in reducing the amount of education lost to pupil leave of absence in term time. Birmingham City Council strongly discourages pupil leave of absence during term time.


# Our current school attendance is 93.3%

The class with the highest attendance in EYFS / KS1 and the winner of the Colmers Cat this week is:






The class with the highest attendance in KS2 and the winner of the Colmers Camel this week is:

Questions to ask your child while reading

Help your child become

-Who is the main character? -What is the setting in the story? Does the setting change? -What was the problem in the story and how was it solved?

-Did the character change during the story? How? -How are you like the main character? How are you different?

-What do you predict will happen next in the story? -Why do you think the author chose this title for the story?


-Do you like the title of the story? Why or why not? -Can you think of a different title for the story? -Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why?

-Which part of the story was the most exciting? Why? -Did you like the end of the story? Why or why not? -Which parts in the story could really happen? Which parts could not really happen?

<u>READ, READ, READ!</u> Reading is a key skill which is so important to any child's development at any age. Please try to listen to your child read at least once a day (for 10-15 mins ideally). It's also great for children to listen to you reading aloud as well.

How was it similar? How was it different? -Did you like the text? Why or why not?
