

Dear Parents/Carers

Happy new year to you all and I hope that you had a wonderful Christmas break. It was wonderful to see and welcome everybody back to school safe and well on Tuesday. Our pupils have all settled quickly back into school this week, even though this can sometimes be difficult after a two-week break.

Writing Week

This week was writing week at our school and each year group has been using the classic tale of 'Around the World in Eighty Day's' by French writer Jules Verne, as a stimulus for their writing. This adventure story, set in Victorian Britain, follows Phileas Fogg and his newly employed French valet, (Passepartout), as they attempt to circumnavigate the world in 80 days to win a wager of £20,000 (equivalent to nearly £2,000,000 in today's money). Our pupils listened to extracts from this story and watched parts of the movie to produce different types of writing and artwork based on this story. The writing produced was fabulous and we will display some of these pieces around the school for everybody to enjoy.



Reading

Developing reading skills are vital to all children's academic progress. We encourage you to listen to your child read as much as possible or to read to your child, ideally at least 10-15 minutes per day. Please remember that a wide selection of age-appropriate online books is available on MyON and that in KS2 our pupils should complete an Accelerated Reader test each time they finish reading their book. Both resources can be accessed via the useful links section on the home page of our website (top right corner). Thank you for helping to support your child's learning.



Help your child become a better READER

Questions to ask your child while reading fiction text.

-Who is the main character?


- -What is the setting in the story? Does the setting change?
- -What was the problem in the story and how was it solved?
- -Did the character change during the story? How?
 -How are you like the main character? How are you
 different?
- -What do you predict will happen next in the story?
- -Why do you think the author chose this title for the story?
- -Do you like the title of the story? Why or why not?
 -Can you think of a different title for the story?
- -Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why?
- -Which part of the story was the most exciting? Why?
- -Did you like the end of the story? Why or why not?
- -Which parts in the story could really happen? Which parts could not really happen?

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READ, READ!

Reading is a key skill which is so important to any child's development at any age. Please try to listen to your child read at least once a day (for 10-15 mins ideally). It's also great for children to listen to you reading aloud as well.

As you know, our children in Years 1-6 have access to thousands of books online via myON. If you need help accessing this, please contact your child's class teacher or the school office.



Help your child become a better READER

Questions to ask your child while reading nonfiction text.

-What is the main idea of the text?

-Can you tell me something you already know about this topic?

-What did you learn from reading the text?

-Are there any words that you do not know what they mean?

-What are some new words that you learned?

-Do you have any questions after reading this?

-Were there any features (diagrams, charts, pictures)
that were important?

-Where could you find out more information about this topic?

-What questions would you ask the author about this topic?

-What would be a good title for this text?

-Can you think of another book that you have read about this topic? How was it similar? How was it different?

-Did you like the text? Why or why not?
