- their freedoms and the freedoms of others;
- their parents;
- the identity, language and values of countries - including their own.

Education should prepare children and young people for a responsible life in a free society. It should teach them how to live in an understanding and tolerant way that is non-violent and that respects the environment.

## Help your child become a better READER <br> Questions to ask your child while reading fiction text. <br> -Who is the main character? <br> -What is the setting in the story? Does the setting change? <br> -What was the problem in the story and how was it solved? <br> -Did the character change during the story? How? -How are you like the main character? How are you different? <br> -What do youpredict will happen next in the story? -Why do you think the author chose this title for the story? <br> -Do you like the title of the story? Why or why not? -Can you think of a different fitle for the story? -Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why? <br> -Which part of the story was the most exciting? Why? -Did you like the end of the story? Why or why not? -Which parts in the story could really happen? Which parts could not really happen? <br>  <br> READ, READ, READ! Reading is a key skill which is so important to any child's development at any age. Please try to listen to your child read at least once a day (for 10-15 mins ideally). It's also great for children to listen to you reading aloud as well. <br> As you know, our children in Years 1-6 have access to thousands of books online via myON. If you need help accessing this, please contact your child's class teacher or the school office. <br> Help your child become a better OEADE? <br> Questions to ask your child while reading nonfiction text. <br> -What is the main idea of the text? <br> -Can you tell me something you already know about this topic? <br> -What did you learn from reading the text? -Are there any words that you do not know what they mean? <br> -What are some new words that you learned? -Do you have any questions after reading this? -Were there any features (diagrams, charts, pictures) that were important? <br> -Where could you find out more information about this topic? <br> -What questions would you ask the author about this topic? <br> -What would be a good fitle for this text? -Can you think of another book that you have read about this topic? How was it similar? How was it different? <br> -Did you like the text? Why or why not?
