E-Safety Quiz for Pupils

Use the below question with your child to see if they can stay safe online.

Cyber harassment is the use of email, social media and websites to bully or upset a person or a group. What should you do it have this happen to you?

- (b) Block them, but don't tell anybody about it.
- (c) Block them and tell a trusted adult.



This week's answer = C. Cyber harassment and bullying can happen 24/7 and can happen in your home. It is important that you tell an adult about this if it ever happens to you. They will be able to help make it stop and to stop you worrying about it.

Measles across Birmingham

With recent cases of measles across the West Midlands, it has never been more important to ensure that yourself and others are protected – especially at the start of a new term.

The MMR immunisation is the best way to protect yourself and others against measles because it is **effective**, **safe and free of charge**. Two doses are needed for the best protection.

The first dose of the MMR immunisation is normally given soon after the first birthday, and a second dose given at 3 years and 4 months, just before starting school. Those born on or after 1 July 2024 will move to a new MMR schedule, with the first dose remaining at 12 months, and the second dose moving from 3 years 4 months to 18 months. However, you can catch up with missed MMR doses at any age. If you or your children are not yet vaccinated, then the start of a new term is the ideal opportunity.

Research shows there is **no** link between the MMR immunisation and autism.

The MMR immunisation is **safe for all faiths and cultures**. A pork-free version is available for those who avoid pork products, which is called Priorix. It is available at every GP practice, and it is free.





To further develop ORACY skills for children here at Colmers Farm, we would encourage all parents to ask their child the below question to further develop their understanding, learning and ORACY skills around the topics they are currently learning about in school.

Reception: Tell us what happened when the tiger came for tea.

Year 1: What are all of the ways we can make 6?

Year 2: What happened to the Titanic?

Year 3: What are some of the features of Rio de Janeiro?

Year 4: How did the Romans conquer Britain? When did it happen?

Year 5: What does a relief map show us?

Year 6: How do you add and subtract fractions with different denominators?
